REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Senator Chaudhary from the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources, to which was referred

S.F. No. 3811: A bill for an act relating to natural resources; providing for wildlife disease management; providing civil penalties; amending Minnesota Statutes 2006, section 97A.045,

subdivision 11.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Senator Cohen from the Committee on Finance, to which was re-referred

S.F. No. 3069: A bill for an act relating to motor vehicles; requiring commissioner of public safety to issue special 2008 U.S. Women's Open license plates.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

"Section 1. U.S. OPEN SPECIAL TEMPORARY PERMITS.

Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) "Committee" means the 2008 U.S. Women's Open Committee.

- (b) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of public safety.
- Subd. 2. **Issuance and design.** Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes, section 168.1293, upon the request of the committee, the commissioner shall issue to the committee a minimum of 250 special temporary permits for use in connection with the 2008 United States Golf Association Women's Open Championship. The special temporary permits must be of a design approved by the commissioner after consultation with the committee. The permits may be displayed only on a passenger vehicle, the use of which has been donated for the open championship by the vehicle manufacturer. The permits are valid from the date of issuance until July 4, 2008.
- Subd. 3. Fees. The commissioner shall collect a fee of \$10 for each pair of special temporary permits issued under this section.
- Subd. 4. **Application.** In requesting special temporary permits under this section, the committee shall provide the following information to the commissioner at least 60 days before the start of the period for which the permits are requested:
 - (1) the dates of the period for which the permits are requested;

- (2) the name, address, and telephone number of an authorized representative of the committee;
- (3) the quantity of permits requested; and
- (4) a certification that the insurance required under Minnesota Statutes, section 65B.49, subdivision 3, will be provided for each vehicle for which special temporary permits are provided under this section.
- Subd. 5. **Liability.** If a parking violation citation is issued for a violation committed by a driver of a vehicle displaying special temporary permits issued under this section, the committee is liable for the amount of fine, penalty assessment, late payment penalty, or cost of warrants issued in connection with the violation unless, within 15 days after receiving knowledge of the violation, the committee provides to the issuing authority the following information to the extent available: the driver's full name; home address; local address, if any; license number; and employer's name and address. If the committee is relieved of liability under this subdivision, the person who committed the violation remains liable for the violation.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment."

No. 3728: A bill for an act relating to agriculture; providing requirements for cattle herds within certain areas; providing for control of bovine tuberculosis; appropriating money to the Board of Animal Health for the buyout of cattle herds in certain areas; amending Minnesota Statutes 2007 Supplement, section 35.244; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 35.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

"Section 1. [35.086] BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS MANAGEMENT ZONE; RESTRICTIONS.

Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) The definitions in this subdivision apply to this section.

- (b) "Bovine tuberculosis management zone" means the area within the ten-mile radius around the five presumptive tuberculosis-positive deer sampled during the fall 2006 hunter-harvested surveillance effort.
 - (c) "Located within" means that the herd is kept in the area for at least a part of the year.
- Subd. 2. Cattle herd buyout. (a) The board shall offer a herd buyout payment to cattle owners with existing cattle that are located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone. The payment shall be \$500 per animal. By September 1, 2008, the cattle owner must accept or decline the offer for herd buyout payments under this subdivision. A cattle owner receiving payment under this section must sign a contract with the board that provides:

- (1) all cattle located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone will be slaughtered by December 31, 2008;
- (2) the cattle owner will not have or allow any cattle to be located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone, unless authorized by the board; and
- (3) the cattle owner who violates a condition under this subdivision must repay all payments received under this section and be subject to penalties for violations under this chapter.
- (b) After the effective date of this section, cattle shall not be moved into the bovine tuberculosis management zone, unless authorized by the board.
- (c) Prior to making any payments under this subdivision, the board shall verify all cattle for which a contract has been signed under this subdivision have been slaughtered.
- (d) In addition to the herd buyout payment under paragraph (a), a cattle owner who signs a contract under paragraph (a) shall receive an annual payment of \$75 for each animal slaughtered. The board shall make the first annual payment by June 30, 2009, and make annual payments by June 30 each year thereafter until the area receives a bovine tuberculosis-free status and the owner is authorized by the board to have cattle located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone.
- Subd. 3. Cattle herds remaining in the zone. The board shall conduct a risk assessment for cattle that continue to be located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone after December 31, 2008. If the board determines that cattle herds that continue to be located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone present a risk of cattle and deer interaction, the board shall require the owner of the cattle to keep all cattle in a manner that does not allow cattle and deer interface. The board may also require that any stored forage crops located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone are kept in a manner that does not allow deer access. The board shall offer cost-share assistance for fencing under subdivision 4 to a person who is required to:
 - (1) keep cattle in a manner that does not allow cattle and deer interface; or
 - (2) keep stored forage crops in a manner that does not allow deer access.
- Subd. 4. Cost-share assistance for fencing. (a) The board shall provide cost-share assistance to persons for fencing cattle and stored forage crops in areas where the board determines that there is an unacceptable risk of transmitting bovine tuberculosis to deer. The cost-share payments shall be 90 percent of the cost of an approved fence up to \$75,000. The payments under this subdivision shall be on a reimbursement basis and paid by the board after the board determines that the fence is built to the specifications required by the board.
- (b) The board shall establish specifications for fences that qualify for cost-share assistance under this subdivision and provide cattle owners with a list of approved fencing contractors. The fencing must be constructed and maintained by an approved fencing contractor, the landowner, or the tenant.
- (c) The board shall periodically inspect fences for which cost-share assistance has been received under this subdivision. If the board determines that a fence for which cost-share assistance has been received is not being maintained or used properly, the board may:
 - (1) order that the fence be repaired or used properly; or
 - (2) place the herd under quarantine and require repayment to the board of any cost-share

assistance received by the person.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2007 Supplement, section 35.244, is amended to read:

35.244 RULES FOR CONTROL OF BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS.

Subdivision 1. **Designation of zones.** The board has the authority to control tuberculosis and the movement of cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae within and between tuberculosis zones in the state. Zones within the state may be designated as accreditation preparatory, modified accredited, modified accredited advanced, or accredited free as those terms are defined in Code of Federal Regulations, title 9, part 77. The board may designate tuberculosis zones that contain not more than 300 herds.

- Subd. 2. Control within modified accredited zone. In a modified accredited zone, the board has the authority to:
- (1) require owners of cattle, bison, goats, or farmed cervidae to report personal contact information and location of livestock to the board;
- (2) require a permit or movement certificates for all cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae moving between premises within the zone or leaving or entering the zone;
- (3) require official identification of all cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae within the zone or leaving or entering the zone;
- (4) require a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to movement for any individual cattle, bison, goats, or farmed cervidae leaving the zone with the exception of cattle moving under permit directly to a slaughter facility under state or federal inspection;
- (5) require a whole-herd tuberculosis test within 12 months prior to moving breeding cattle out of the zone;
 - (6) require annual herd inventories on all cattle, bison, goats, or farmed cervidae herds; and
- (7) require that a risk assessment be performed to evaluate the interaction of free-ranging deer with cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae herds and require the owner to implement the recommendations of the risk assessment.
- <u>Subd. 3.</u> <u>Authority to adopt rules.</u> The board may adopt rules to provide for the control of tuberculosis in cattle. The rules may include provisions for quarantine, tests, and such other measures as the board deems appropriate. Federal regulations, as provided by Code of Federal Regulations, title 9, part 77, and the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Uniform Methods and Rules, are incorporated as part of the rules in this state.
 - Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2006, section 97A.045, subdivision 11, is amended to read:
- Subd. 11. **Power to prevent or control wildlife disease.** (a) If the commissioner determines that action is necessary to prevent or control a wildlife disease, the commissioner may prevent or control wildlife disease in a species of wild animal in addition to the protection provided by the game and fish laws by further limiting, closing, expanding, or opening seasons or areas of the state; by reducing or increasing limits in areas of the state; by establishing disease management zones; by authorizing free licenses; by allowing shooting from motor vehicles by persons designated by

the commissioner; by issuing replacement licenses for sick animals; by requiring sample collection from hunter-harvested animals; by limiting wild animal possession, transportation, and disposition; and by restricting wildlife feeding.

- (b) The commissioner shall restrict wildlife feeding within a 15-mile 30-mile radius of a cattle herd that is infected with bovine tuberculosis. In addition to any other penalties provided by law, a person who violates a law restricting wildlife feeding within a bovine tuberculosis management zone may not obtain a hunting license to take a wild animal for two years after the date of conviction.
- (c) The commissioner may prevent or control wildlife disease in a species of wild animal in the state by emergency rule adopted under section 84.027, subdivision 13.

Sec. 4. BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL; TEMPORARY ASSESSMENT; APPROPRIATION.

- (a) From January 1, 2009, to December 31, 2009, the commissioner of agriculture shall collect a bovine tuberculosis control assessment of \$1 for each head of cattle sold from the first purchaser, as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 17.53, subdivision 8, paragraph (a). Money collected under this section shall be deposited in an account in the special revenue fund and is appropriated to the Board of Animal Health for bovine tuberculosis control activities.
- (b) A cattle owner located in a modified accredited zone established under Minnesota Statutes, section 35.244, may receive a refund of the assessment under paragraph (a) after application to the commissioner of agriculture.

Sec. 5. APPROPRIATION.

- (a) \$472,000 in fiscal year 2008, and \$2,252,000 in fiscal year 2009 from the general fund are appropriated to the Board of Animal Health for monitoring, testing, eradication, education and outreach, other activities the board is required to undertake to comply with federal regulations concerning cattle, bison, and farmed cervidae under a USDA modified accredited status, and annual payments under new Minnesota Statutes, section 35.086. \$80,000 of this appropriation in fiscal year 2009 is for a grant to the North Central Research Center at Grand Rapids to develop best management practices to control bovine tuberculosis. The appropriation for fiscal year 2009 is added to the base.
- (b) \$3,500,000 in fiscal year 2008 from the general fund is appropriated to the Board of Animal Health for payments to cattle owners who remove cattle herds that are located within the bovine tuberculosis management zone and fencing cost-share assistance under new Minnesota Statutes, section 35.086. \$150,000 of this appropriation is for a grant to the North Central Research Center at Grand Rapids to develop best management practices to control bovine tuberculosis. This is a onetime appropriation and is available until spent.
- (c) If an appropriation for the same purpose is enacted in 2008 S.F. No. 3813, article 12, section 4, or its house companion, the comparable appropriation in this section is void.

Sec. 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

Sections 1 to 3, and 5 are effective the day following final enactment."

- Subd. 2. Staff; compensation. The legislative auditor shall establish a Financial Audits Division and a Program Evaluation Division to fulfill the duties prescribed in this section. Each division may be supervised by a deputy auditor, appointed by the legislative auditor, with the approval of the commission, for a term coterminous with the legislative auditor's term. The deputy auditors may be removed before the expiration of their terms only for cause. The legislative auditor and deputy auditors may each appoint a confidential secretary to serve at pleasure. The salaries and benefits of the legislative auditor, deputy auditors and confidential secretaries shall be determined by the compensation plan approved by the Legislative Coordinating Commission. - (3) the cattle owner who violates a condition under this subdivision must repay all payments received under this section and be subject to penalties for violations under this chapter.

- (c) Prior to making any payments under this subdivision, the board shall verify all cattle for which a contract has been signed under this subdivision have been slaughtered.

The cost-share payments shall be 90 percent of the cost of an approved fence up to \$75,000. The payments under this subdivision shall be on a reimbursement basis and paid by the board after the board determines that the fence is built to the specifications required by the board.
- (b) The board shall establish specifications for fences that qualify for cost-share assistance under this subdivision and provide cattle owners with a list of approved fencing contractors. The fencing must be constructed and maintained by an approved fencing contractor, the landowner, or the tenant.
- (c) The board shall periodically inspect fences for which cost-share assistance has been received under this subdivision. If the board determines that a fence for which cost-share assistance has been received is not being maintained or used properly, the board may:
 - (1) order that the fence be repaired or used properly; or
- (2) place the herd under quarantine and require repayment to the board of any cost-share assistance received by the person.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Sec. 7. Minnesota Statutes 2007 Supplement, section 35.244, is amended to read:

35.244 RULES FOR CONTROL OF BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS.

Subdivision 1. **Designation of zones.** The board has the authority to control tuberculosis and the movement of cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae within and between tuberculosis zones in the state. Zones within the state may be designated as accreditation preparatory, modified accredited, modified accredited advanced, or accredited free as those terms are defined in Code of Federal Regulations, title 9, part 77. The board may designate tuberculosis zones that contain not more than 300 herds.

Subd. 2. Control within modified accredited zone. In a modified accredited zone, the board

has the authority to:

- (1) require owners of cattle, bison, goats, or farmed cervidae to report personal contact information and location of livestock to the board;
- (2) require a permit or movement certificates for all cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae moving between premises within the zone or leaving or entering the zone;
- (3) require official identification of all cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae within the zone or leaving or entering the zone;
- (4) require a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to movement for any individual cattle, bison, goats, or farmed cervidae leaving the zone with the exception of cattle moving under permit directly to a slaughter facility under state or federal inspection;
- (5) require a whole-herd tuberculosis test within 12 months prior to moving breeding cattle out of the zone;
 - (6) require annual herd inventories on all cattle, bison, goats, or farmed cervidae herds; and
- (7) require that a risk assessment be performed to evaluate the interaction of free-ranging deer with cattle, bison, goats, and farmed cervidae herds and require the owner to implement the recommendations of the risk assessment.
- <u>Subd. 3.</u> <u>Authority to adopt rules.</u> The board may adopt rules to provide for the control of tuberculosis in cattle. The rules may include provisions for quarantine, tests, and such other measures as the board deems appropriate. Federal regulations, as provided by Code of Federal Regulations, title 9, part 77, and the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Uniform Methods and Rules, are incorporated as part of the rules in this state.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Sec. 8. BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL; TEMPORARY ASSESSMENT; APPROPRIATION.

- (a) From January 1, 2009, to December 31, 2009, the commissioner of agriculture shall collect a bovine tuberculosis control assessment of \$1 for each head of cattle sold from the first purchaser, as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 17.53, subdivision 8, paragraph (a). Money collected under this section shall be deposited in an account in the special revenue fund and is appropriated to the Board of Animal Health for bovine tuberculosis control activities.
- (b) A cattle owner located in a modified accredited zone established under Minnesota Statutes, section 35.244, may receive a refund of the assessment under paragraph (a) after application to the commissioner of agriculture."

on specific fish, wildlife, habitat, and land conservation projects.

- (b) A forest fragmentation and consolidation account is created within the outdoor heritage fund. From the receipts deposited in the fund under the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 15, 20 percent each fiscal year must be credited to the forest fragmentation and consolidation account. Money in the account may be spent only for the acquisition of permanent easements on private forest land or for the acquisition of land for forest consolidation. The conservation easements must guarantee public access, including, but not limited to, hunting and fishing access.
- (c) A conservation partners account is created within the outdoor heritage fund. From the receipts deposited in the fund under the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 15, 20 percent each year must be credited to the conservation partners account. Money in the account may be spent only for matching grants of up to \$250,000 to local sporting and wildlife conservation clubs for the improvement of fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation.
- Subd. 2. Sportsman's Stakeholders Council; membership. (a) The Sportsman's Stakeholders Council shall consist of 11 members to be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. One member shall be appointed from each of the congressional districts, and the remaining members shall be appointed at large. Persons appointed to the council must:
- (1) have experience or expertise in the science, policy, or practice of the preservation, enhancement, and protection of the state's fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation;
- (2) have strong knowledge in the state's fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation issues around the state;
 - (3) represent fishing and wildlife habitat stakeholders; and
 - (4) have demonstrated ability to work in a collaborative environment.
- (b) No member shall, within two years prior to appointment, have received or applied for, in the member's name, a grant, loan, or other form of assistance from the council. No more than four of the members shall, during their terms of office, be officers, directors, or employees of recipient sponsoring organizations. The council members shall annually select from their membership a chair and other officers as they deem necessary.
- Subd. 3. **Terms of office.** Three of the initial members, including one at-large member, shall be appointed to terms ending the first Monday in January in each of the years 2010, 2012, and 2013. The remaining two members shall be appointed to terms ending the first Monday in January 2011. Thereafter, the terms of all members of the council shall be four years. Members may serve until their successors are appointed and qualify. If the governor fails to appoint a successor by July 1 of the year in which the term expires, the term of the member for whom a successor has not been appointed shall extend, subject to the advice and consent of the senate, until the first Monday in January, four years after the scheduled end of the original term.
- Subd. 4. Compensation. Members shall be compensated as provided in section 15.0575, subdivision 3.
- Subd. 5. Removal of members; filling vacancies. A member may be removed by the governor at any time:

- (1) for cause after notice and hearing;
- (2) for failing to submit any report required in subdivision 6; or
- (3) for missing three consecutive scheduled meetings of the council.

The chair shall inform the governor of a member missing the three meetings. The secretary of the council shall inform, in writing, a member after two consecutive missed meetings and before the next meeting, that the member is subject to removal by missing the next meeting. Vacancies on the council shall be filled by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate, for the remainder of the unexpired term.

- Subd. 6. Reports. By November 15 of each year, the council shall prepare and deliver to the legislature and the governor a report, which shall include the following:
- (1) a financial statement showing receipts and disbursements for the year ending the preceding June 30, including a listing of the donors and amount of gifts to the council or its advisory committees valued in excess of \$1,000;
 - (2) a brief description of the activities of the council for the preceding year;
- (3) the number of meetings and approximate hours spent by council members in meetings and on other council activities;
- (4) the names of council members and their addresses, occupations, and dates of appointment and reappointment to the council;
 - (5) the names and job classifications of council employees;
 - (6) a brief summary of council procedures proposed or adopted during the period;
- (7) the number of requests for assistance received by the council and the number of written and oral complaints received from residents of the state relating to the activities of the council or the performance of the duties of the council as provided in this chapter;
- (8) a summary by category of the substance of the complaints and requests referred to in clause (7) above and the responses of the council to them;
 - (9) a listing of all grants, loans, or other forms of assistance given by the council, including:
- (i) the recipients of council assistance who are members of the council or its advisory committees; and
- (ii) each recipient sponsoring organization having a member of the council or its advisory committees as a director, officer, or employee.

The indication required in clause (9), item (ii), shall also specify the name of the member who is the officer, director, or employee.

Subd. 7. **Duties.** (a) The council shall adopt a strategic plan for making expenditures from the outdoor heritage fund, including identifying the priority areas for funding for the next six years. The strategic plan must be reviewed every two years. The strategic plan must have clearly stated shortand long-term goals and strategies for outdoor heritage fund expenditures, must provide measurable

outcomes for expenditures, and must determine areas of emphasis for funding. The council shall consider the long-term strategic plans of agencies with environment and natural resource programs and responsibilities and plans of fish, game, and wildlife conservation organizations during the development and review of the strategic plan.

- (b) The council shall, through the following activities, stimulate the conservation of the fish, game, and wildlife habitat in the state:
 - (1) receive and consider any requests for grants, loans, or other forms of assistance;
- (2) advise and serve as a technical resource at the request of sponsoring organizations and political subdivisions in the state on programs relating to fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation;
- (3) advise and recommend on existing or proposed activities of the departments of the state relating to fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation;
- (4) accept gifts and grants to the council and distribute the same in accordance with the instructions of the donor insofar as the instructions are consistent with the law;
- (5) adopt procedures to be followed by the council in receiving and reviewing requests for grants, loans, or other forms of assistance;
- (6) adopt standards consistent with this section to be followed by the council in the distribution of grants, loans, and other forms of assistance;
- (7) distribute, according to the above procedures and standards, grants, loans, and other forms of assistance for fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation activities to departments and agencies of the state, political subdivisions, sponsoring organizations, and, in appropriate cases, to individuals engaged in fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation, provided that a member of the council shall not participate in deliberations or voting on assistance to groups or persons in which that member has an interest as officer, director, employee, or recipient; and
- (8) appoint advisory committees, which the council determines are essential to the performance of its powers and duties under this section, provided that no member of an advisory committee shall serve on a committee to which the member has an application pending for a grant, loan, or other form of assistance from the council or its predecessor, the state.
- Subd. 8. Executive director; staff. The director shall be selected by a majority of the council and shall serve at the pleasure of the council. The director shall be knowledgable in fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation, and shall have demonstrated proficiency in the administration of programs related to fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation. The director is the chief administrative officer of the council and is responsible for performing the executive duties of the council as provided in this chapter. The director shall not be a member of the council. All other employees of the council shall be in the classified civil service of the state. No employee of the council or its advisory committees may be an applicant for or recipient of council assistance, nor may an employee be an officer, director, or employee of a recipient sponsoring organization.
- Subd. 9. Statewide information and publicity. The council shall develop and implement a comprehensive statewide information and publicity system. In its report required under subdivision 5, the council shall summarize its activities pursuant to this subdivision.

- Subd. 10. **Contracting.** The council may contract as necessary in the performance of its duties.
- Subd. 11. **Public meetings.** Meetings of the council and other groups the council may establish must be conducted according to chapter 13D.
- Subd. 12. **Appropriation.** The council's receipts from the sale of publications, mailing lists, recordings or media projects, and fees from seminars or workshops are annually appropriated to the council for the purposes of this section.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective November 15, 2008, if the constitutional amendment proposed in Laws 2008, chapter 151, is adopted by the voters."

If any one or more provision, section, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is found to be unconstitutional, the same is hereby declared to be severable and the balance of this act shall remain effective notwithstanding such unconstitutionality. The legislature hereby declares that it would have passed this act, and each provision, section, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more provision, section, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word be declared unconstitutional.
- Subd. 3. **Supreme Court jurisdiction.** The Minnesota Supreme Court has original jurisdiction over an action challenging the constitutionality of this section and shall expedite the resolution of the action."

"Sec. 8. [97A.056] OUTDOOR HERITAGE FUND; LESSARD-HERITAGE ENHANCEMENT COUNCIL.

- Subdivision 1. **Outdoor heritage fund.** (a) The outdoor heritage fund is established in the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 15. All money earned by the outdoor heritage fund must be credited to the fund. At least 97 percent of the money appropriated from the fund must be spent on specific fish, wildlife, habitat, and land conservation projects.
- (b) A forest fragmentation and consolidation account is created within the outdoor heritage fund. From the receipts deposited in the fund under the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 15, 20 percent each fiscal year must be credited to the forest fragmentation and consolidation account. Money in the account may be spent only for the acquisition of permanent easements on private forest land or for the acquisition of land for forest consolidation. The conservation easements must guarantee public access, including, but not limited to, hunting and fishing access.
- (c) A conservation partners account is created within the outdoor heritage fund. From the receipts deposited in the fund under the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 15, 20 percent each year must be credited to the conservation partners account. Money in the account may be spent only for matching grants of up to \$250,000 to local sporting and wildlife conservation clubs for the improvement of fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation.
- Subd. 2. Lessard-Heritage Enhancement Council. (a) The Lessard-Heritage Enhancement Council of 16 members is created in the legislative branch, consisting of:
- (1) three members of the senate appointed by the senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration;
 - (2) three members of the house of representatives appointed by the speaker of the house;
- (3) three public members representing hunting, fishing, and wildlife habitat conservation stakeholders appointed by the senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration;
- (4) three public members representing hunting, fishing, and wildlife habitat conservation stakeholders appointed by the speaker of the house; and
- (5) four public members representing hunting, fishing, and wildlife habitat conservation stakeholders appointed by the governor.
- (b) One member from the senate and one member from the house of representatives must be from the minority caucus.
- (c) At least one public member appointed by the speaker of the house and one public member appointed by the senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration must be a woman. At least two of the public members appointed by the governor must be women. At least one of the public members appointed by the governor must be an ethnic minority. Appointing authorities shall consider geographic balance in making appointments under this section.
 - (d) The public members appointed and recommended to the appointing authorities according to

subdivision 3 must:

- (1) have experience or expertise in the science, policy, or practice of preservation, enhancement, and protection of the state's fish, game, and wildlife habitat;
- (2) have strong knowledge in the state's fish, game, and wildlife habitat conservation issues around the state; and
 - (3) have demonstrated the ability to work in a collaborative environment.
 - (e) A public member may be removed by an appointing authority for cause.
- (f) Citizen members serve four-year terms and shall be initially appointed according to the following schedule of terms:
 - (1) two members appointed by the governor for a term ending the first Monday in January 2013;
- (2) two members appointed by the senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration for a term ending the first Monday in January 2013, and two members appointed by the speaker of the house for a term ending the first Monday in January 2013;
 - (3) one member appointed by the governor for a term ending the first Monday in January 2012;
- (4) one member appointed by the senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration for a term ending the first Monday in January 2012, and one member appointed by the speaker of the house for a term ending the first Monday in January 2012; and
 - (5) one member appointed by the governor for a term ending the first Monday in January 2011.
- (g) Legislative members are entitled to reimbursement for per diem expenses plus travel expenses incurred in the services of the council. The removal and, beginning July 1, 2009, the compensation of public members is as provided in section 15.0575.
- (h) The first meeting of the council shall be convened by the chair of the Legislative Coordinating Commission. Members shall elect a chair, vice chair, secretary, and other officers as determined by the council. The chair may convene meetings as necessary to conduct the duties prescribed by this section.
- (i) Legislative membership terms are at the pleasure of the appointing authority, except that members shall serve on the council until their successors are appointed.
 - (j) The governor's appointments to the council are subject to the advice and consent of the senate.
- (k) Vacancies occurring on the council do not affect the authority of the remaining members of the council to carry out their duties.
- (l) In addition to the appointments in paragraph (a), each appointing authority shall appoint one nonvoting member under the age of 18.
- Subd. 3. Citizen selection committee. (a) The governor shall appoint an Outdoor Heritage Fund Citizen Selection Committee of five members who come from different regions of the state and represent hunting and fishing stakeholders. The duties of the Outdoor Heritage Enhancement Fund Citizen Selection Committee shall be to:

- (1) identify citizen candidates to be public members of the council, as part of the open appointments process under section 15.0597;
 - (2) request and review citizen candidate applications to be members of the council; and
- (3) interview the citizen candidates and recommend an adequate pool of candidates to be selected for council membership by the governor, the senate, and the house of representatives. Compensation of members is as provided in section 15.0575.
- (b) The Outdoor Heritage Enhancement Fund Citizen Selection Committee shall give strong consideration to recommending candidates under the age of 30.
- Subd. 4. Strategic plan required. (a) The council shall adopt a strategic plan for making expenditures from the outdoor heritage fund, including identifying the priority areas for funding for the next six years. The strategic plan must be reviewed every two years. The strategic plan must have clearly stated short-term and long-term goals and strategies for outdoor heritage fund expenditures, must provide measurable outcomes for expenditures, and must determine areas of emphasis for funding.
- (b) The council shall consider the long-term strategic plans of agencies with environment and natural resource programs and responsibilities and plans of fish, game, and wildlife conservation organizations during the development and review of the strategic plan.
- Subd. 5. **Duties of council.** (a) The council, in consultation with statewide and local fishing, hunting, wildlife, forestry, agriculture, and land conservation groups, shall develop a biennial budget plan to recommend expenditures from the outdoor heritage fund to the legislature and the governor. Approval of the biennial budget plan for the outdoor heritage fund requires an affirmative vote of at least 11 members of the council.
- (b) In the biennial budget submitted to the legislature, the governor shall submit separate budget detail for planned expenditures from the outdoor heritage fund as recommended by the council.
- (c) As a condition of acceptance of an appropriation from the outdoor heritage fund, an agency or entity receiving an appropriation shall submit a work program and quarterly progress reports for appropriations from the outdoor heritage fund to the members of the Lessard-Heritage Enhancement Council in the form determined by the council.
- Subd. 6. Council administration. (a) The council may employ personnel and contract with consultants as necessary to carry out the functions and duties of the council. Permanent employees shall be in the unclassified service. The council may request staff assistance, legal opinion, and data from agencies of state government as needed for the execution of the responsibilities of the council.
- (b) Beginning July 1, 2009, the administrative expenses of the council shall be paid from the outdoor heritage fund, as appropriated by law.
- (c) A council member or an employee of the council may not participate in or vote on a decision of the council relating to an organization in which the member or employee has either a direct or indirect personal financial interest. While serving on or employed by the council, a person shall avoid any potential conflict of interest.
 - Subd. 7. Open meetings. (a) Meetings of the council and other groups the council may establish

must be open to the public. Except where prohibited by law, the council shall establish additional processes to broaden public involvement in all aspects of its deliberations. For the purposes of this subdivision, a meeting occurs when a quorum is present and action is taken regarding a matter within the jurisdiction of the council.

(b) For legislative members of the council, enforcement of this subdivision shall be governed by section 3.055, subdivision 2. For nonlegislative members of the council, enforcement of this subdivision shall be governed by section 13D.06, subdivisions 1 and 2.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective November 15, 2008, if the constitutional amendment proposed in Laws 2008, chapter 151, is adopted by the voters."

123B.749 STRUCTURALLY BALANCED SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGETS.

<u>Subdivision 1.</u> <u>Board resolution.</u> (a) <u>Prior to Before approving a collective bargaining agreement that does not result from an interest arbitration decision, a school board must determine by board resolution that the proposed agreement will not cause structural imbalance in the district's budget during the agreement period of the agreement.</u>

- (b) A school board may only determine that an agreement will not cause structural imbalance only if expenditures will not exceed available funds, taking into account:
 - (1) current state aid formulas; and
- (2) reasonable and comprehensive projections of ongoing revenues and expenditures for the period of the agreement. It is expected that The board must not use one time revenue may not be used

for ongoing expenditures. Any amount in excess of the board's resolution for the district's general fund balance is not onetime revenue under this section. The school board must make available with the resolution a summary of the projections and calculations supporting the determination. The projections and calculations must include state aid formulas, pupil units, and employee costs, including that reflect the terms of all applicable labor agreements, including the agreement under consideration, its fringe benefits, severance pay, and staff changes.

- (c) In addition to the determination required in <u>under</u> paragraph (a), the school board must project revenues, expenditures, and fund balances for <u>one year two years</u> following the period of the agreement. The projections must include the <u>information</u> categories of information described in under paragraph (b), be reasonable and comprehensive, and reference current state aid formulas.
- (d) The board must make available all projections and calculations required by this section must be made available and estimated district employee terminations to the public prior to and before, at, and after the meeting where the board adopts the resolution is adopted in a manner, consistent with state law on public notice and access to public data.
- (e) In an interest arbitration, the district must submit, and the exclusive bargaining representative may submit, proposed determinations with supporting projections and calculations consistent with paragraph (b) of the effect of the potential decision on the structural balance of the district's budget. The arbitrator must consider the potential effect of a decision on the structural balance of the district's budget for the term of the agreement. The arbitrator's decision must describe the effect of the decision on the structural balance of the district's budget in a manner consistent with paragraph (b). The arbitrator's decision also must also show the effect of the decision on the school budget for one year following the term of the contract at issue. Within 30 days of receipt of the decision or when the board receives or acts on the decision, whichever is earlier, the school board must by resolution determine the effect of the decision on the structural balance of its budget for the term of the agreement consistent with paragraph (b).
- (f) The board must submit a copy of the resolution with the supporting projections and calculations must be submitted to the commissioner of education with the uniform collective bargaining agreement settlement document within 30 days of adoption of adopting the resolution. The commissioner must develop a model form for use by districts to use in reporting projections and calculations. The commissioner must not accept any reports that do not comply with this section. The commissioner must make all resolutions, projections, and calculations available to the public.
- (g) Compliance with this section by itself is not an unfair labor practice under section 179A.13, subdivision 2.
- Subd. 2. State aid penalty. (a) If a board does not submit a report to the commissioner under subdivision 1, paragraph (f), the department must reduce the state aid paid to the public employer for that fiscal year.
- (b) The aid reduction must equal \$25 times the number of adjusted pupil units for the district during that fiscal year.
- (c) The department must reduce general education aid; if general education aid is insufficient or not paid, the department must reduce other state aids.
